Sea Scout advancement is about seamanship, including customs & courtesies, boat handling & maintenance, swimming & lifesaving, rope handling, communications, close-order drill, first aid, navigation, maritime history, leadership, service to others, and Scouting ideals.

Why Coweta District?

Many Scouters know our Skipper, Sam Young. Professionally, he's an engineer and project & program manager.

Last year, he brought everything he had to the Gulf Coast to clean up the oil spill on the beach.

As a member of the command center, almost everyone around him could speak boats, except him. There were 950 of them.

Membership

Sea Scouts brings out best in a Scout and Scouting. Our Ship is open to all young people between the ages of 13-21 any time after completing the 8th grade. We are a co-ed unit.

In Ship 378, Scouts decide whether they want to be part of the Working Crew or just have fun. Working Crew members participate in advancement opportunities, compete in competitions, and lead the ship.

Young people today are busy with many things and they're all welcome to participate in the program developed and lead by the Working Crew.

One of our primary purposes is to help Scouts complete their Eagle Rank. We extend a special invitation to Scouts who would otherwise leave the Scouting program to join us to attain Scouting's highest honor to ensure opportunities are open for them for the rest of their lives.

Our next formal recruiting event is Sunday, 14 Aug 11, at the Coweta Veterans Hall. However, anyone can join before then. The purpose of the event is to charter the Ship, but we'd prefer to do so before then.

What Else Should You Know?

Successful Sea Scout programs meet twice weekly: on a week night for training and Saturday for practice and workdays. We meet year around and slow down only for extended holidays. No one is expected to attend every meeting. We're brothers & sisters, families, and friends who like to hang out together.

Working Crew members participate more often to take advantage of advancement opportunities, prepare for competitions, leadership training, and run Ship 378 affairs.

Wednesday night meetings are usually held at either the Veterans Hall in Newnan, GA or at the Skipper's house.

Sea Scouts puts the "Outing" in Scouting. We could be anywhere. During sailing season, we're likely to be with Ship 100 at Camp Alatoona Aquatics Base. Otherwise, we probably close to the Newnan area practicing or working on something.

Special Activities: 2011-2012

Ship 378 has several activities everyone is encouraged to participate in this year!

Project C.O.P.E. Sea Scouting is about team building. There's no better fun-filled to do this than BSA's Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience (C.O.P.E.). We'll do this after sailing season this fall with Venture Crews and Sea Scout Ships

Water Mania. This is a day of pure aquatic fun on 27 Aug 11 where Boy Scouts, Sea Scouts, and Venturers from around Atlanta gather for a chance to try a bit of everything: swimming, canoeing, motor boating, sailing, rowing, and games. We will both participate in and help lead the event.

Commodore's Cup. Sea Scout sailing championships and regional regatta at Camp Alatoona Aquatics Base 17 Sep 11. Competition open to Sea Scout and Venturing units

Coweta District Camporee. Part of our service to others is to give back to the program that got us here. Besides running a major event and display, we'll do a precision flag ceremony the weekend of 21-23 Oct 11.
